

El Tovar

Stay at the crown jewel of Historic National Park Lodges, the legendary El Tovar, located directly on the rim of the Grand Canyon. Envisioned as a cross between a Swiss chalet and a Norwegian villa, it first opened its doors in




Yellowstone National Park Lodges

Deep canyons, misty waterfalls, steamy geysers. Vast valleys of a dazzling diversity of wildlife. With nearly 3,500 square miles to cover, exploring Yellowstone National Park is full of unforgettable experiences. And with more than its share of great lodges, there's more to Yellowstone than meets its wild eye. Discover or rediscover the magic of the world's first national park, a truly extraordinary geothermal wonder.

Old Faithful Inn

The most famous structure in Yellowstone—and possibly in any national park—is the distinctive Old Faithful Inn. With its trademark gabled, shingled roof, the Inn was built in 1903–1904 with local logs and stone, drawing its inspiration from nature, and is considered the largest log structure in the world.

Old Faithful Snow Lodge & Cabins

If you think Yellowstone is only a destination for warmer days, picture this. A snow covered wonderland with frozen waterfalls, snowy woods, and abundant wildlife. Accessible in winter only by oversnow vehicles (snowcoaches or snowmobiles), the Old Faithful Snow Lodge is rustic and warm, isolated and inviting. Enjoy the charm of heavy timber beams, rustic wood furniture, and cozy beds equipped with comfy blankets. Warm up by a bonfire outdoors or lounge with a hot drink by the fire. Stay in the main lodge or a quaint, cozy cabin, with the famed Old Faithful geyser a short walk away.



More Places To Stay In Yellowstone

To awaken your Old West spirit, stay at the rustic Roosevelt Lodge & Cabins, built in 1920 near a campsite once used by President Theodore Roosevelt, or go where your itinerary takes you—to any number of other hotels, lodges, cabins, and campgrounds inside the park. With nine lodging facilities offering over 2,000 rooms, accommodations in Yellowstone National Park are as varied as they are plentiful, in any season.

Glacier National Park Lodges

Seemingly endless acres of rugged and breathtaking landscapes. A tribute to wild natural places. Glacier National Park was established in 1910 as part of the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park, a symbol of shared stewardship and the deep-rooted relationship between Canada and the U.S. The landscape and wildlife may be the star attractions here, but the historic lodges are just as important to the rich heritage of Glacier National Park.

Many Glacier Hotel

This historic hotel is also the largest in the park, the "Switzerland of North America." Perched on the shores of Swiftcurrent Lake in a majestic valley, this magnificent swiss chalet style hotel was built in 1914–15. If the setting surrounding the hotel is awe-inspiring, the inside is nothing short of spectacular. With its magnificent towering lobby, cathedral height

ceiling in the dining room (complete with dramatic trusses, enormous fireplace, and panoramic vistas), and the hotel's signature double-helix staircase, it's easy to see why it's listed as a National Historic Landmark. The five-story hotel contains two suites, seven family rooms, and 205 guest rooms that are rustic, yet comfortable.

Located just outside the park, Cedar Creek Lodge is inspired by the people, culture, and landscapes of Montana. A traditional mountain retreat in grand surroundings, with modern style, sweeping mountain views, and upscale rooms and suites. 

Lake McDonald Lodge

Another Swiss architecture-style gem with a stunning, multi-story lobby, Lake McDonald Lodge sits on a picturesque location on the eastern shore of beautiful Lake McDonald. Built in 1913, this historic lodge has 82 rustic, yet comfortable guest rooms split between the three-story main lodge, a row of cabins, Snyder Hall, and the exquisite Cobb House. A National Historic Landmark and listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Lodge is at the hub of activity, with the "jammer" Red Bus tours, boat cruises, horseback rides, evening ranger programs, and numerous other activities close by.

Zion National Park Lodge

In the heart of incredible Zion Canyon with unparalleled views of the towering sandstone cliffs. A hiker's paradise, the ultimate escape. Zion Lodge is modest in comparison to its majestic surroundings but your stay is anything but. Originally designed by Gilbert Stanley Underwood (a frequent architect of national park lodges) in the 1920s, Zion Lodge was completed in 1925 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Built with whole logs and less stonework than you typically see in national park buildings, it is the only accommodation inside the park.

Sitting in harmony with the landscape and scale of the surroundings, most rooms and suites of the warm and inviting main lodge have a private porch or balcony and the 40 historic cabins feature fireplaces and private porches. The perfect place to add your story to the many complex and beautiful layers of Zion.
